Residential Interior Remodel

Project Description

The client expressed their desire to renovate the entire existing interior layout with the exception of the existing stairwell and some walls and ceiling surfaces. A defined circulation pattern was created throughout the entire house. Massive structural work was required to remove existing weight bearing walls and post in order to open up the first level floor plan. Rooms were redefined and incorporated with heated floor tiles, mechanical blinds, and lowered slab elevation to create functional spaces that served the client's needs.

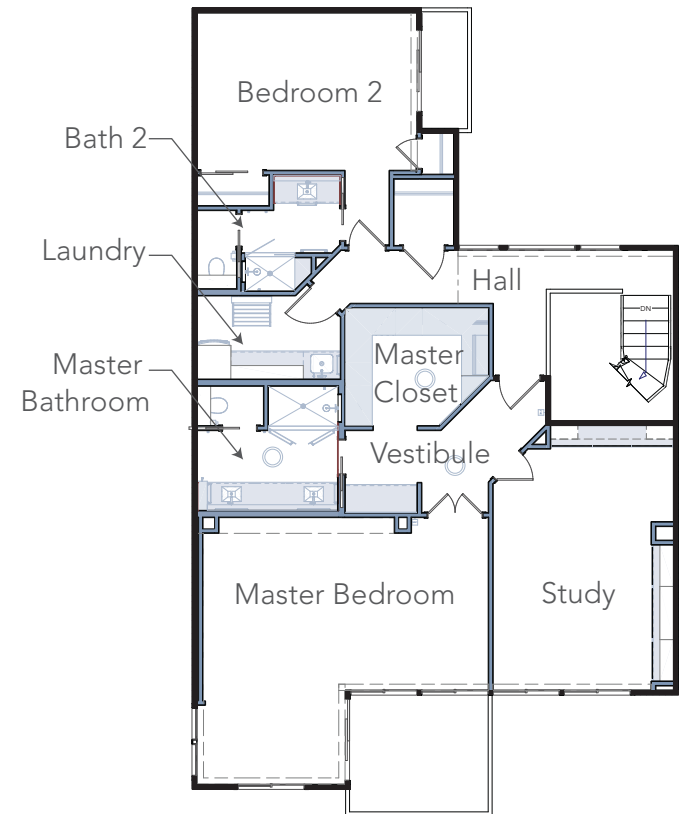
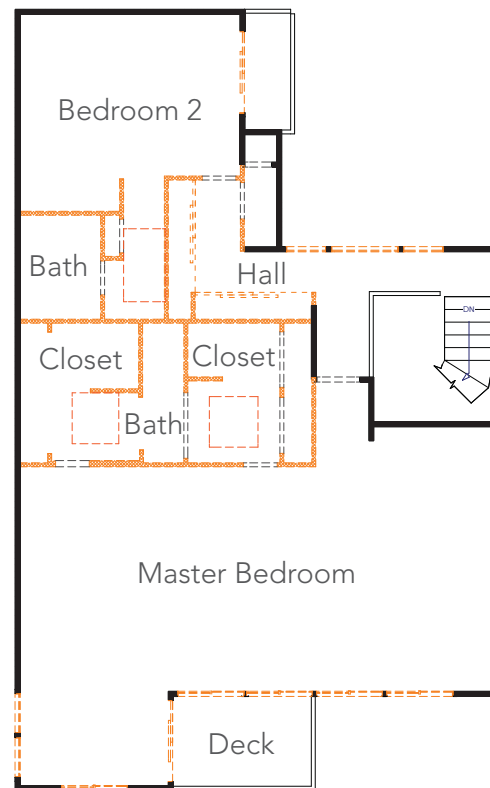
Existing 1st Floor vs New 1st Floor

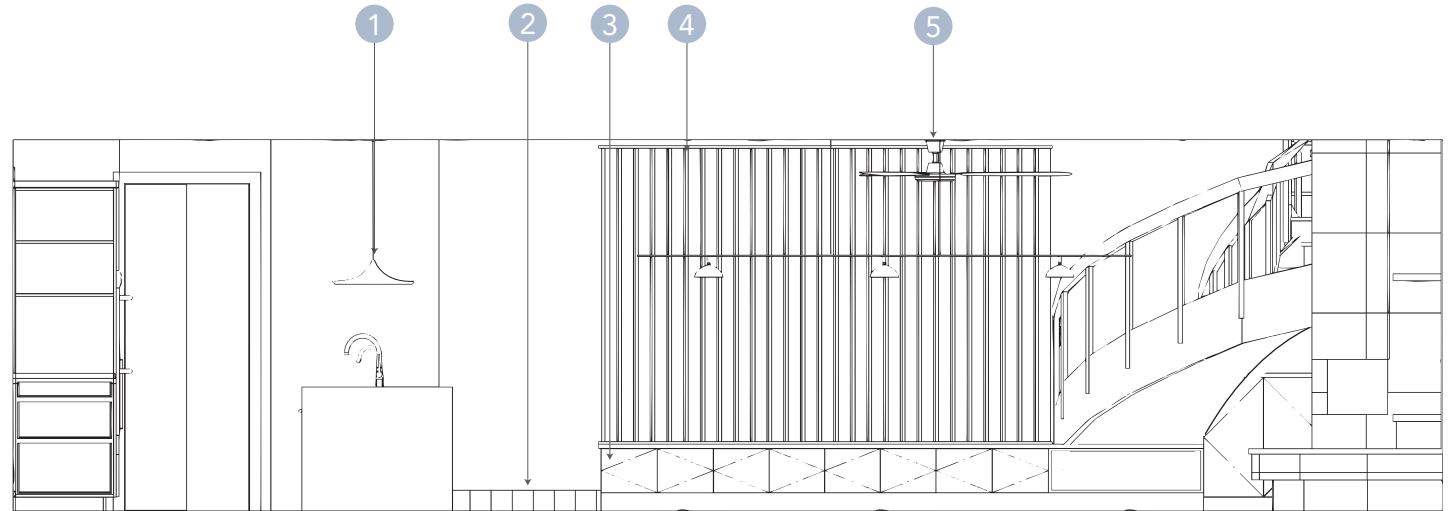

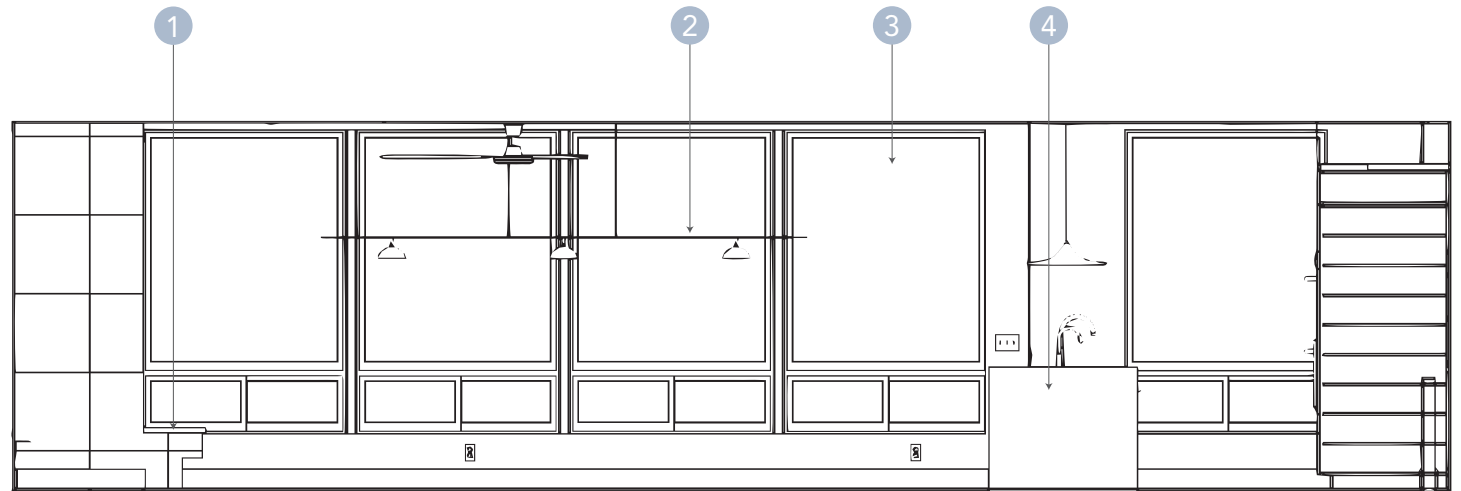

Before



The original kitchen was small and segregated from the rest of the house; it also had antiquated finishes and style.

After



The walls surrounding the kitchen were demolished to open up the space to the rest of the house. In addition, the floor was also lowered to give the kitchen a higher ceiling and good flow with the adjacent living room. A monumental island was created to satisfy needs for private cooking lessons at home.

Before / After

Originally the living room was divided by a dropped beam on the ceiling and steel post. The fireplace had a rustic finish that greatly contrasted with the beautiful curved staircase. The entry door opened directly into the living room space, depriving it of privacy.



A series of steel beams were installed to replace the dropped beam and post and allow a more open floor plan. The design was created to incorporate the stairs as part of the space. Vertical louvers were installed between the family room and entry to add privacy.



Before / After

The original dining room was a small dark space with a low ceiling, mirrored walls, and void of any natural light.



The dining room was relocated to take advantage of the beautiful golf course views and natural light near the windows.



Before / After

The living room, dining room and kitchen lacked any relationship between each other. Additionally, the awkward elevation change of sunken living room segregated circulation patterns & created a hazardous transition between spaces.



Walls were removed and the concrete slab floors were lowered to open up the spaces and create a cohesive relationship between them.



Before / After

The original fireplace was old and appeared outdated; it stood out from the space. Its location away from the stairwell created an awkward area to utilize.



The new gas fireplace was shifted closer to the spiral stairs to open up the corner window. The fireplace was turned into a focal point with contemporary design, materials and colors; this combination made it the heart of the space.

Before / After

The original study was a dark and gloomy extension of the master bedroom. It also was home to a similar masonry fireplace as the one in the living room.



The study was turned into a separate redefined space. Color was added to the study to create a more light and vibrant space.



Master Bedroom Before



The beams and ceiling in the master bedroom were extremely dark; it made the space feel heavy and lifeless.

Master Bedroom After



To make the master bedroom feel airy and welcoming, beams and ceiling were painted a light color. In addition, lighting was added at the top of the beams. Heated tile floors and stained maple trim added throughout the house provided the spaces with a physical and visual warmth.

Master Bathroom After



The original master bathroom had no access to natural lighting. To alleviate this issue, a tubular skylight was added to the space. Ceramic tile and light colors added to the walls served to reflect the natural lighting. Bamboo cabinets provided warmth to the contemporary space.

Bath 1 After



The contemporary appearance and style was echoed throughout the bathrooms. The continuous side vertical light fixtures on the mirror are the main source of light for this space. Thanks to the 3d tiles used on the walls, the continuous vertical lights were sufficient in illuminating the space. A floating bamboo cabinet was used to make the space feel open.

Power Room After

The powder room was made to feel larger with the implementation of mirrors on all the walls above the tiled wainscot. The addition of the mirrored walls gives the illusion of a room that seems to go on forever.
